### THOUGHT FROM THE CHAIR

An article in The Irish Times recently featured an expedition to an area in Indonesian western New Guinea called the Foja Mountains. The mountains are so remote that the local animals are unafraid of humans and the expedition found new species of plants and frogs. As well as this, a new species of bird (a honeyeater) was discovered. This is not as rare an occurrence as one might think; new species of birds are found almost annually, normally in tropical forest zones (surely a good argument against uncontrolled logging).

There is no need to go to the other side of the world to see unusual birds, though. In recent years Galway Branch members have seen Firecrest, Waxwing, Rose-coloured Starling and Ring Ouzel in their neighbourhoods, so members who participate in the winter Garden Birds Survey are in with a chance of a surprise. However, the winter is nearly over, the days are getting longer and the first primroses are in flower. With this in mind it is not too early to remind you that National Dawn Chorus Day is the 14th of May this year. Happy St. Patrick's Day and here's to summer!

### FALSTERBO FÄGELSTATION, SWEDEN

From the 1st August to 22nd October 2005 I was lucky enough to be an assistant ringer at Falsterbo Bird Observatory or "Fågelstation" in the extreme southwest of Sweden. Migration has been studied at this location since the early 1940s. Research into migration is examined by use of visual migration counts at Nabben point and standardized ringing at Flommen reedbed and the Lighthouse garden.

I was ringing in Flommen reedbed during all of August and September. This involved putting up 21 nets an hour before sunrise every morning, extracting birds from nets every half hour and "processing" the birds which included the sexing, ageing, measurement of the wing length, weight, fat and moult scores of each bird. The main target species here were Reed, Sedge, Marsh, Willow Warblers, Reed Bunting and other typical reedbed specialties, which are missed at the Lighthouse garden. From 21st July to 30th September 2845 birds were caught at Flommen. Although the number of birds caught each day could be low (< 30 birds) we did manage to cross the hundred mark on a few occasions. Some highlights for myself included Spotted Crane, Kingfisher, Wryneck, Thrush Nightingale, Bluethroat (2), Great Reed Warbler (5), Wood Warbler, Penduline (29) and Bearded Tit, Red-backed Shrike (8) and Common Rosefinch. The Wryneck was an amazing bird in the hand. It was easy to see where they get their name from as the can twist and rotate the head and neck in a similar manner to a snake.

Once the Flommen season had finished we moved up to the Lighthouse garden to help the other ringers who had been ringing there since July. Although this involved the

same early routine it was without doubt a far easier "gig". Unlike Flommen we didn't have to trudge through knee high water and muck on each round and had a cosy ringing hut with luxuries such as running water and electricity! The numbers of birds caught during the first two weeks here were sometimes staggering. 1277 and 1595 birds were caught on 3rd and 5th October alone. Some high day totals of common species included 417 Siskins, 947 Robins, 455 Goldcrests and 607 Blue Tits. During my three weeks in October we caught 9168 birds. It was quiet strange coming from an Irish perspective seeing the likes of Blue Tits, Wrens, Robins and Dunnocks in active migration. Some of the more interesting species here were Great and Lesser Spotted Woodpecker, Ring Ouzel, Icterine Warblers (breeding in the garden), Barred Warbler, Firecrest, Red-breasted Flycatcher (5), Long-tailed Tits of the white headed *caudatus* race, Nuthatch (2), Serin and Great Grey Shrike. The woodpeckers, shrikes and Blue Tits could be rather uncooperative to say the least when they were being extracted from nets and ringed. The Blue Tit has long been associated Falsterbo and for good reason. On 28th September 2003 for example 30,600 were counted on migration while 1,954 of those were ringed alone in the garden. It was also the commonest species caught at this location during my time.

### THE LONG-EARED OWL

Among the most secretive of our native birds little is known about the status and distribution of the Long-eared Owl in Ireland. Population estimates vary from 500 – 1800 pairs

but numbers are probably less well known than any other species of raptor or owl in Ireland. They are known to breed throughout the county and have been recorded breeding as far west as Roundstone and as close to Galway city as Dangan in recent years. Though they are known to breed in both deciduous and coniferous woodland they appear to favour the latter in Ireland. Plantations of Sitka Spruce surrounded by farmland or rough grassland hold a particular attraction for Long-eared Owls and a large majority of our breeding pairs are probably located in such habitat. Smaller copses of Scots Pine, Birch and mixed woodland are also favoured nesting sites.

Being strictly nocturnal it does not easily lend itself to observation or study. March, however, presents an excellent opportunity to gain some insight into the breeding status of this secretive bird. March sees the pre-breeding call of the Long-eared Owl reach its climax with males advertising themselves and defending territories. The territorial song of the male consists of a series of deep hooting "oh" sounds repeated at 2-3 second intervals. The call of the female can best be compared to the noise of blowing through paper held over a comb. Between 30-40 hoots are usually given before the male engages in a display flight, often involving wing clapping, around its territory. Long-eared Owls tend to call from, or near to, the woodland edge and it is here they should be looked and listened for. In early March males may begin to call from dusk onwards. By positioning yourself near a suitable woodland edge you may be lucky enough to encounter this beautiful bird. Choose a still, dry night to give yourself the best chance and give yourself two to three hours at a particular site. Should anyone be lucky enough to locate any birds could I request that they please pass on any details to me in person or to any committee member as it is hoped to organise a survey for 2007 and any preliminary records would be most welcome
